





FROM THE VICE PRESIDENT



What meetings should I attend? The County, District, State, National or the Seminars? Which is most important? Where can I get the most information? Where can I get my voice heard? How can I get involved?

All of these meetings are important and all are necessary in the organization. Our National Officers are representing you, yes even if you are not a member of the NRLCA.

Let's consider these meetings in reverse order. The National Convention is quite an experience. I recommend it to everyone. Several hundred delegates from all the States convene and the business is conducted by the Nat-

ional Officers. You must be an elected delegate to have any input into these meetings. However, visitors are encouraged to attend. How do you get to be a delegate? Let your State Sedretary know you would like to have your name placed on the ballot.

The State Convention is much smaller in numbers than the National Convention. Once again you must be an elected delegate to have any input into the meetings. By input I mean to be able to vote. This convention lasts 3 days and is very busy. There is time for recreation in the evenings, but the business sessions are all day long all three days. There are resolutions to consider. Several committees are appointed to help the officers get all the business done and of course there is election of officers for the next year.

The District Meetings are held once a year in each of the 4 districts. There are several county groups in each district. Your District Committeeperson is nominated at this meeting and elected at the State Convention. This Committeeperson is responsible to represent and to pass on information to the County Meetings. This Committeeperson is a member of the State Board and attends all Board Meetings.

The County Meetings, which meet from twice a year to monthly depending on which county you belong to, is where the roots are planted. If you are a member of the NRLCA you can be involved. You can become a delegate to the State Convention and will be eligible for a committee assignment. You can become an officer of your county unit and help your fellow employees get their voice heard. You will have the opportunity to meet fellow carriers from neighboring towns. I have found these groups to be friendly and sociable. This is where everyone gets started into the NRLCA family. I think this is the most important group we have.

This is a very short generalization of the meetings. There are a lot of things to do and a lot of nice, friendly people to meet and get to know as friends.

If you are curious and want to know more, come to any of these meetings. If you are not a member of the NRLCA we encourage you to come and listen and ask questions. This organization is yours and if you want to have your voice heard, please come.

There are other meetings for the Rural Carrier and his family to attend. These are informal meetings. Our State Steward, Neil Buchanan, conducts Steward or Contract Seminars once a year on each side of the state. There is a Fall Booster Meeting once a year where we have special guests, including a National Officer. The Western States Conference is a mini National Convention where you have the opportunity to hear our National President and other guests. You have an opportunity to have all your questions answered.

Your letters should be brief and to the point, perhaps not to exceed two paragraphs. Be sure, only one subject per letter.



Why Isn't Your Sub A Member?

FROM YOUR STATE STEWARD



Still counting down for Quality of Work Life. The southern half of Idaho that belongs to the Salt Lake Division is supposed to begin the process this month (March), Oregon has scheduled a planning meeting for early in April. Washington had tentative plans for the second week in April, but that now appears to be on hold again.

As a craft, we are experiencing an unprecidented amount of serious discipline. We have high hopes that Quality of Work Life/Employee Involvement will reduce the number and the severity of the cases we

have, the way the process has in other states.

While on the subject of discipline, a few very serious words of advice to Rural Craft Employees. The Postal Service is sending lots of test mail through the system in an attempt to entrap employees. Be sure none of it sticks to you!

Examples are pay to the bearer checks to a phony address and pay to bearer coupons and valuable appearing parcels to a non-existent address. Employees, including Rural Carriers, are losing their jobs over the above and similar items.

I hope none of us have the occasion to be interviewed by the inspection service. Should it happen, the National Agreement, Article 17, Section 3, Paragraph 3, makes it permissible to have a union representative present. INSIST on exercising that privilege, don't waive your rights. Don't sign anything. Don't co-operate!

If you are given the choice of signing even the most innocent looking statement or going to jail, go to jail and make your phone call from there.

In virtually every removal case I have seen, the most damaging evidence against the carrier has been the statement signed for the Postal Inspectors.

Remember, the Postal Inspection Service has a 98% conviction rate. That's better than the K.G.B. Don't be a part of this record.

I realize that if you are reading this article that few, if any of the following ways to wreck a union apply to you. Perhaps you will share it with someone it might help.

Seventeen ways in which a member can injure his organization - thus injure its chances of doing a better job of protecting your interests. Are you guilty of any of these?


- 1. Don't attend meetings, but if you do, arrive late.



YOU NEED TO DO

Compiled from speech by National Officer Steve Smith at Bakersfield

There is no simple way to explain how the new retirement system, known as FERS, may affect regular carriers and some of the decisions they will need to make between now and Dec. 31,

The main thing to remember is to keep reading all you can and take the time to get the direct information finally from a computer that will be located in each MSC.

All those carriers who were regulars before Jan. 1, 1984 are still under the old Civil Service Retirement System (CSRS) as we have known it for years. We can stay under it if you want to, but you have from July 1 of this year to Dec. 31, 1987 to decide to get out of the old system and into the new Federal Employees Retirement System (FERS).

There are some good points to each system and there are some not so good. There seems to be no formula that you can automatically say which one is the better for any one carrier because of each carrier's personal situation and plans for retirement funds.

The FERS program offers a Thrift Plan that is very similar to the IRA's as we know them. The Postal Service will even match dollar for dollar up to 5% of our deposits into the FERS retirement program, you also can put in up to 10% of your earnings and all your deposits are tax-deferred until you draw them out.

New regular carriers -- who have been hired after Jan. 1, 1987 are automatically in the FERS program and can't get out. The regulars mentioned above may elect to switch one time, but may not get out of FERS once they elect to get in.

The third class of carriers are regulars who were hired Jan. 1, 1984 to Jan. 1 1007 who had a total of more than 5 years service as both a regular and a 78 by Jan. 1, 1987. They are the old CSRS program and have a chance come July 1 to go into FERS or stay where they are.

If you are a new hire since Jan. 1, 1984 and do not have a total of five years, (off a register or from an RCR status) you are in the FERS program now.

One reminder, is that everyone should look at any new Form 50's passed out. If it says you are automatically transferred into FERS, be sure you were properly put there according to the regulations above mentioned and not by a computer "goof-up" and it is happening to several in the past few weeks. If in doubt, talk to your local steward, area steward or state steward.




